Now in its 67th year, the Australian Youth Orchestra continues to be recognised as one of the world's most esteemed training grounds for young orchestral musicians. The unique and varied program of AYO activities, together with a rewarding and challenging program of repertoire directed by inspiring conductors and tutors is renowned for providing transformative experiences for young musicians.

AYO's reputation continues to attract some of the world's leading conductors and soloists to direct, mentor, and inspire young players in Australia and overseas. In 2014, AYO was honoured to be joined by a team of brilliant soloists and conductors including, Ray Chen, James Morrison, Genevieve Lacey, William Barton, Simone Young, Richard Gill, Alexandre Bloch, James Judd, and Nicholas Carter, All of these artists shared their talents and skills with the members of the AYO in performance and workshops and masterclasses which were then made available to an international audience through our Digital Connection initiative.

Our invaluable partnership with Accenture has enabled AYO to be at the forefront of the use of digital technology for orchestral training whereby our players can be connected to members of our global community.

During 2014 the Board considered what additional strategies AYO could contribute to respond to the national goal of every school student having access to music education. We are delighted to be able to provide a home for the National Music Teacher Mentoring Pilot Program created and directed by Richard Gill OAM. Supported by the Australian Government's Ministry for the Arts and Department of Education, AYO will host the national coordination of this three year pilot program.

I would like to acknowledge our gratitude for the vital support of the Australian Government for AYO's training programs, the Digital Connection Trials and the new National Teacher Mentoring Program.

I am proud of our professional management team and staff under the skilled leadership of Colin Cornish and I congratulate and thank them most warmly for their commitment to developing the next generation of musicians. To my fellow board directors, I express my sincere gratitude for their contribution and support of this wonderful organisation.

From the CEO

As an organisation that exists to develop the musical skills of young Australian musicians to the highest level, the Australian Youth Orchestra occupies a unique place in the education and arts sectors. Throughout 2014, more than 400 of the country's best young musicians participated in twelve training programs held in metropolitan and regional centres in all states and territories of Australia. Through a broad range of workshops and masterclasses AYO reached more than 2500 individuals in schools, community centres, homes, and online.

In order to ensure that the greatest number of young musicians between the ages of 12 and 30 have the opportunity to join with likeminded individuals, and grain access to training and guidance from AYO's network of tutors and conductors, it is crucial that the organisation maintains a wide geographical reach and a strong digital presence.. To reach the most talented young musicians from across the whole of Australia, auditions for our 2014 programs were once again held Australia-wide, reaching all capital cities and major regional centres. Through the AYO Digital Connection Initiative we continue to refine the use of remote online auditions in order to increase access to AYO auditions in the future.

AYO National Music Camp 2014 was held at the Australian National University School of Music in Canberra under the Musical Direction of Richard Gill OAM. Richard was joined by dynamic young French conductor Alexandre Bloch, and chamber orchestra director Geoffrey Lancaster. Richard's program for Camp covered a vast repertoire and explored topics relevant to the players, composers, administrators, and producers of today. Six new compositions were performed this year including two orchestral works commissioned from young Australian composers,

Andrew Howes and Philip Jameson. We are grateful to the The Silo Collective for commissioning Andrew Howes' work *Ichirós*.

Following a triumphant international tour in 2013, the Australian Youth Orchestra welcomed many new young musicians into the Orchestra for its two concert seasons in Adelaide and Brisbane. The AYO February Season was led by conductor James Judd with Trumpet soloist, James Morrison, who performed Graeme Koehne's *High Art* at the Adelaide Town Hall.

The AYO July Season saw the AYO debut of sensational violin soloist Ray Chen, who together with conductor Simone Young and the orchestra delivered a memorable concert at the Queensland Performing Arts Centre. Six Professional Development sessions were held during the program covering topics including orchestral sight-reading, musicians' health and wellbeing. AYO presented two Digital Connection Initiative activities during the program. The first was the AYO Violin Masterclass with Ray Chen, which was streamed live via AYO's youtube channel and promoted by The Violin Channel. AYO violinists Iona Allan, Rollin Zhao and Alexander Chiu performed for 30 minutes each. To date over 1000 people have viewed the masterclass.

The AYO's commitment to developing the skills and aptitude of musicians in non-orchestral settings was reflected in the continuation of a number of successful chamber music programs. Two AYO Regional Residencies – one for brass quintet, the other for string quartet – were held in 2014. The former was conducted in the Gippsland Region, Victoria and the latter in Perth and regional Western Australia. During these residencies each member of

the AYO ensemble was given the opportunity to develop their skills as mentors and workshop directors through the school workshop components. Over the course of the Brass Quintet's 9-day tour the ensemble presented 5 public performances in Traralgon, Bairnsdale, Sale, Meeniyan and Drouin; and presented school workshops in Traralgon, Bairnsdale, Sale, Foster and Warragul. On the last day of the program they presented 2 Interactive workshops as part of AYO's Digital Connection Initiative using video conferencing to connect year 5 and 6 students at Our Lady Help of Christians Primary School in Melbourne with students at Dunedoo Primary School in regional NSW. The string quartet resident in WA presented 6 public concerts and 9 school workshops in Bunbury, Margaret River, Busselton, Dunsborough, Dalyellup, Mandurah and Perth.

AYO Chamber Players was held in Melbourne, VIC. This year 4 established string quartets and 1 piano trio participated. In addition, there were 6 violinists, 2 violas, 4 cellos, 2 pianos and a wind quintet involved in the program. Howard Penny was engaged to be the Music Director and was joined by a fabulous team of tutors, including the Eggner Trio, Monica Curro, Kirsty Hilton, Robin Wilson, Tobias Breider, Jo St Leon, David Griffiths and Rachel Silver. Howard's programming of repertoire focussed on Romanticism as its theme. Howard also pressed the importance of allowing the participants to perform not only in quartets, trios and quintets but to explore works that were slightly bigger and performed less frequently. This meant that there were a range of ensembles from trios to a nonet. The recently renovated Melba Hall was the perfect venue for chamber music with both concerts well attended.

For younger musicians, the 2014 AYO Young Symphonists program was held in Mount Eliza, Victoria under the direction of conductor Max McBride. In conjunction with the orchestral repertoire, participants also had the opportunity to work on both ensemble (brass, percussion) and chamber music. All participants performed in at least one of two in-house chamber music concerts, while the orchestral repertoire was performed in the public concert, held at the Frankston Arts Centre.

At the other end of the spectrum, musicians who are on the cusp of entering professional careers were again involved in AYO's Orchestral Career Development program, held in collaboration with the Melbourne and Tasmanian Symphony Orchestras. Each of these programs provides the opportunity for successful musicians to receive expert coaching and explore life in the profession. This year 31 AYO musicians joined with the Tasmanian Symphony Orchestra to perform works by Strauss and Mahler under the guidance of the TSO Chief Conductor, Marko Letonja. This program once again offered AYO musicians some fantastic exposure to the professional music working environment and experience.

During the year we presented three pilot projects involving a chamber ensemble plus sinfonietta size ensemble as part of our future program development work. These new ensemble programs are aimed at musicians on the verge of a professional career and in particular, those interested in creating a "portfolio" career. These pilot projects involved collaborations with an exceptional team of Australian artists – Nicholas Carter, Genevieve Lacey, William Barton, Fabian Russell, Karin Schaupp and Graeme Koehne. Through rehearsals, recordings, and workshops the

members of these new ensembles refined their skills in chamber music, small orchestra and solo works, new music, and workshop presentation. The ensembles performed in the Melbourne Recital Centre, City Recital Hall Angel Place, MPavillion, and regional venues in NSW and Queensland. One of the most exciting opportunities for young composers in recent years is the Fanfare competition which resulted in this AYO ensemble recording fanfares by eight young composers for presentation at the Sydney Opera House throughout 2015. This type of partnership, along with instrumental workshops with the Dandenong Ranges Music Council, are a crucial component of this new training and performance program. A range of new projects involving these ensembles will be launched in 2015.

The AYO was honoured to receive an invitation to play at the G20 Leaders' summit in Brisbane, at which an ensemble of AYO players together with William Barton were invited to perform at the leaders' reception. The performance of William Barton's work, *Birdsong at Dusk*, was the feature performance and AYO was proud to represent the artistic achievements of young Australian in front of this global audience.

We are grateful to the many organisations that partner with AYO to present our annual programs and concerts. In 2014, the Australian National University School of Music, University of Melbourne, University of Queensland, Musica Viva, Sydney Opera House, Tasmanian Symphony Orchestra, Melbourne Symphony Orchestra, Symphony Services International, and ABC Classic FM were amongst those enabling the delivery of our training.

We have moved into our new premises in Melbourne in 2014, which provide significantly enhanced facilities for our staff and Board, and also house our

Digital Connection studios. We are grateful to our new Major Partner, Naomi Milgrom AO for making this possible.

Finally, it would be impossible to bring off such an ambitious program of activities without the alignment of the following critical elements:

- the financial support of the Australian Government; our Principal Sponsor Accenture, and other corporate partners; Major Programs Partner, Colonial Foundation and other philanthropic supporters; and hundreds of generous individuals who donate funds to AYO each year.
- the support and counsel of the AYO Board of Directors, led by Chairman, Mary Vallentine AO;
- the dedication, professionalism and sheer hard work of the AYO staff; and
- the skill, passion, energy, and brilliance of the musicians of the Australian Youth Orchestra.






Gender of participants






Gender of applicants

Principal activities

The company's principal continuing activities during the year consisted of the management of classical music training programs for young people.

The programs develop and encourage the study and enjoyment of music by young people through residential courses, concerts, tours, recording and broadcasts

These programs include: AYO National Music Camp, The Australian Youth Orchestra – February and July Seasons, AYO Chamber Players, AYO Young Symphonists, AYO Regional Residencies, AYO Orchestral Career Development.

No significant change in the nature of the activities occurred during the year.

Dividends

Clause 37.1 of the constitution of Australian Youth Orchestra prohibits the distribution of income and property by way of dividend to members.

Accordingly, the directors do not recommend the payment of a dividend and no dividends have been paid or declared since the end of the previous financial year.

Comments on the operation and the results of those operations are set out below:

(a) Results

The Net Operating Surplus for 2014 was \$527,381 (2013 Surplus \$302,162).

- The Ministry for the Arts, formerly the Department of Regional Australia, Local Government, Arts and Sport, approved a recurrent grant of \$2,526,000 for 2014/15, of which \$1,069,202 has been brought to account in the 2014 financial year, and a grant of \$2,285,000 for 2013/2014, of which \$1,350,230 has been brought to account in the 2014 financial year.
- The Ministry for the Arts, approved a one off grant of \$540,000 to fund the National Music Teacher Mentorship Pilot Program to be implemented over a three year period from 2014 2017. \$37,341 was brought to account in 2014 to fund the project.
- The Department of Education, formerly the Department of Education, Employment and Workplace Relations (DEEWR) approved a one off grant of \$1,574,000 to fund the AYO Digital Connection Trial to be implemented over a four year period from 2012 to 2015. \$772,887 was brought to account in 2014 to fund the project.
- A net amount of \$151,147 was raised during the year towards the next International Tour in 2016. This amount was transferred into the International Touring Reserve at the end of the year.
- AYO charged a Management Fee to both the Dorothy Fraser Scholarship Fund (\$2,399) and the National Music Camp Trust Fund (\$1,601). This fee is based on 1.2% of the balance of each fund at 31 December 2014.

Australian Youth Orchestra Directors' Report (Continued) For the year ended 31st December 2014

- The Colonial Foundation donated \$193,000 in 2014, of which \$95,000 has been brought to account in 2014 to support the Chamber Players and Young Symphonists programs in 2014. The remaining \$98,000 is to support these programs in 2015. Funding of \$189,000 for these programs was also received in 2013, of which \$96,000 has been brought to account in 2014 to support the Chamber Players and Young Symphonists programs in 2014.
 - The following transfers were made to/(from) the Scholarship Reserve in 2014, totalling \$10,829:
 - Net transfer to the Ernest Llewellyn Scholarship funds of \$4.864 made up of \$17.864 interest earned less \$13,000 scholarships paid.
 - Net transfer to the Richard Pollett Memorial Award funds of \$5,965 made up of \$8,400 donations, plus \$5,565 interest earned, less \$8,000 award paid in 2014.
- A net amount of \$138,712 was transferred to the Major Gifts Reserve during the year representing bequests of \$151,865, plus \$16,554 interest offset by \$29,707 to cover campaign costs during the year.

Note 1 Summary of significant accounting policies

a. Basis of accounting

Australian Youth Orchestra has elected to early adopt the pronouncements AASB 1053: Application of Tiers of Australian Accounting Standards and AASB 2010–2: Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards arising from Reduced Disclosure Requirements to the annual reporting period beginning 1 January 2010.

This general purpose financial report has been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Interpretations, Australian Accounting Standards, other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board, and the Corporations Act 2001

The company's Statement of Comprehensive Income, Balance Sheet and Statement of Changes in Equity have been prepared on an accrual basis and are in accordance with the historical cost convention. The Statement of Cash Flows has been prepared on a cash basis

The financial report has been prepared based on a twelve month operating cycle and presented in Australian currency.

b. Changes in accounting policy

Accounting policies are consistent with those of the previous year.

c. Income tax

No provision for income tax is required as the company is exempt from income tax.

d. Revenue recognition

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable. Amounts disclosed are net of goods and services tax (GST). Revenue is recognised for the major business activities as follows:

(i) Contribution income

Contribution income represents the fair value of assets received in excess of the cost of the assets where there is a non reciprocal transfer and is recognised as income once the asset is controlled by the Company.

(ii) Funding revenue

Funding revenue is received from the Ministry for the Arts (formerly the Department of Regional Australia, Local Government, Arts and Sport) and the Department of Education (formerly the Department of Employment and Workplace Relations based on payment schedules contained in a funding agreement between the funding bodies and the Company and is recognised in the calendar year for which it is intended under the terms of the agreement due to the conditional nature of the funding. Any funding not spent on the planned activities agreed between the parties at the start of each calendar year is required to be repaid.

(iii) Registration and Membership Fees

Registration and Membership Fees are recognised in the period for which the membership or registration is applicable.

(iv) Sponsorship and Donations revenue

Sponsorship – Sponsorship commitments are brought to account as income in the year in which sponsorship benefits are bestowed.

Donations - All donations are brought to account as received.

(v) Performance Fee Revenue

Revenue from performance fees is recognised as these services are performed.

e. Receivables

All debtors are recognized at the amounts receivable, as they are due for settlement immediately in the case of trade debtors, and no more than 30 days from the date of recognition for other debtors.

Collectability of debtors is reviewed on an ongoing basis. Individual debts which are known to be uncollectible are written off. A provision for doubtful debts is raised when uncertainty exists as to the collection of the debt.

f. Plant and equipment

Each class of plant and equipment is carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually by directors to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from those assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows which will be

received from the assets employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have not been discounted to present values in determining the recoverable amount.

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets is depreciated on a straight line basis over their useful lives to the company commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

g. Leased plant and equipment

Leases of plant and equipment are classified as operating leases as the lessors retain substantially all of the risks and benefits of ownership. Payments made under operating leases (net of any incentives received from the lessor) are charged to the statement of comprehensive income on a straight-line basis over the period of the lease.

h. Trade and other creditors

These amounts represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the company prior to the end of the financial year and which were unpaid at balance date. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition.

i. Maintenance and repairs

The cost of repairs to the company's plant and equipment are charged as expenses as incurred, except where they relate to the replacement of the component of an asset, in which case the costs are capitalised and depreciated in accordance with note 1(f).

j. Website and database costs

Costs in relation to web sites and databases controlled by the company are charged as expenses in the period in which they are incurred if they do not change the underlying nature or structure of the website or database. Costs incurred in building or enhancing a website or database, to the extent that they represent probable future economic benefits controlled by the company that can be reliably measured, are capitalised as an asset and amortised over the period of expected benefits, usually 2-3 years.

k. Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses, and assets are recognized net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognized as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the Statement of Financial Position are shown inclusive of GST.

I. Employee benefits

(i) Wages, salaries and annual leave

Liabilities for employee benefits for wages, salaries and annual leave expected to be settled within 12 months of the reporting date represent present obligations resulting from employees' services provided up to the reporting date. These are calculated at undiscounted amounts based on compensation rates that the consolidated entity expects to pay, including related on-costs.

(ii) Long service benefits

The provision for employee benefits for long service leave represents the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made, resulting from employees' services provided up to the reporting date. The provision is calculated using expected future increases in wage and salary rates including related on costs and expected settlement dates based on turnover history and is discounted using the rates attaching to Commonwealth government bonds at balance date which most closely match the terms of maturity of the related liabilities.

(iii) Superannuation

The Company contributes to employees' superannuation funds. Contributions are recognised as an expense as they are made.

m. Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with financial institutions, other short-term, highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value. For the purposes of the Cash Flow Statement, cash and cash equivalents consist of cash and cash equivalents as defined above.

n. Comparative figures

Where required by the Accounting Standards comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to changes in presentation for the current financial year.

o. Significant accounting judgements, estimates and assumptions

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts in the financial statements. Management continually evaluates its judgements and estimates in relation to assets, liabilities, contingent liabilities, revenue and expenses. The following critical accounting policies have been identified for which significant judgements, estimates and assumptions are made.

(i) Impairment of Non-financial Assets

The Company assesses impairment of its non-financial assets at each reporting date by evaluating conditions specific to the Company and to the specific asset. If an impairment trigger exists the recoverable amount of the asset is determined. Management do not consider that the triggers for impairment have been significant and these assets have not been tested for impairment in this financial period.

(ii) Estimate of Useful Lives

The estimation of useful lives of assets is based on historical experience. The condition of assets is assessed periodically and considered in relation to the remaining useful life of the asset and adjustments made to useful lives as appropriate.


